In this week's parshah we find the mitzvah of zechiras Amalek- remembering what Amalek did to us in the desert. Rav Moshe Feinstein zt"l, in the sefer Darash Moshe, submits that although nowadays we cannot fulfill the dictum of physically wiping out Amalek, the Torah intended a second, separate reason for remembering Amalek, which is in fact very relevant to us today. And that is, to always have a reminder of the depths that we human beings are capable of descending to. As we know, the Exodos from Egypt, with all the signs and miracles, was a clear-as-day proof to the entire world that Hashem is One, Hashem's dominion is over everything, and Hashem and His holy nation are inseparable. The nations of the world were quaking in their boots over the Jews. Amalek's flat out refusal to learn those clear-as-day lessons, and to actually go and wage war against the Jews (a suicide war) showed a level of commitment to their evil ideology that is very hard to fathom.

The Torah wants us to realize that Amalek was flesh and blood just like we are. The human capacity is such that man can reach the highest of heights- yet also reach depths such as we see here. Therefore a person can never feel that he is 'beyond' doing a sin- even a grave sin. As it says in Avos 2:4, 'Do not trust yourself until the day of death'. The yetzer harah is always there. May we all have help from Hashem in the continued fight with the yetzer harah, and may we all merit a good, sweet year. Good Shabbos!
