According to Rashi and the Ramban, Korach began his rebellion because he felt that Moshe Rabbeinu was employing nepotism in choosing his brother Aharon as Kohen Gadol and his close relative Elitzaphon ben Uziel as the Nasi of Shevet Levi. However, the Ramban points out that Moshe had made these appointments much earlier. Why did Korach choose to try and overthrow Moshe now?

Rav Frand writes that until recently, Moshe was extremely popular with the Jewish people. He had led us out of Mitzrayim, split the Yam Suf, and brought us the Torah. We had food, water, and protection. However, things started to change in the past few parshios. We learn of the Misonenim (Complainers), the quail, and finally, the Chet Ha'Meraglim (Sin of the Spies) where the Jewish people learn that they will die in the desert. Unlike the Chet Ha'Egel (Sin of the Golden Calf), Moshe did not daven for the Jewish people, and Korach saw his opportunity to strike.

Rav Yeruchem Levovitz writes that the people were now disenchanted with Moshe and blaming him for all of the punishments that they were receiving since he was not pleading with Hashem on their behalf. Looking at this from a rational angle, however, it is very difficult to blame Moshe for any of this. He took no part in complaining against Hashem, get bored of the mun, or weep at the idea of having to fight giants in order to conquer Israel. The Jews had taken on a victim mentality, projecting their mistakes onto their leader.

Instead of taking responsibility, we tend to charge others with our shortcomings. We can view ourselves as victims and others as oppressors. One of Canadian clinical psychologist and psychology professor Jordan Peterson's 12 Rules for Life is "Set your house in perfect order before you criticize the world." Had the members of Korach's rebellion taken these words into consideration, they would not have joined and would have stayed home and done something productive.
